Background:

Pursuant to the requirements of the Virginia Code, if City Council wishes to consider the application of the Southeast Rural Community Assistance Project, Inc. and 347 West Campbell LLC, for tax exempt status for real and personal property, Council must first conduct a public hearing. 347 West Campbell a Virginia limited liability company and a wholly owned subsidiary of Southeast Rural Community Assistance Project, Inc. (SERCAP) a Virginia non-stock, non-profit corporation has applied for tax exemption of real and personal property located in the City, at 347 West Campbell Avenue SW (Official Tax Map #1010827).

Considerations:

SERCAP was organized in August 1969 as Demonstration Water Project and incorporated under Virginia law as the Virginia Water Project, Inc. in January 1976. SERCAP is part of a national network of non-profit organizations dedicated to empower and assist rural low income people to improve the quality of life in their communities. SERCAP seeks to cultivate, support, promote and encourage potable and waste water systems by and for the people in a seven state service area. SERCAP acquired the property of 347 W. Campbell Avenue in 2006. SERCAP has made substantial improvements to the building located on the property. The director of real estate valuation, pursuant to 32-101.20 et seq. of the Code of the City of Roanoke (1979) as amended granted SERCAP a rehabilitation tax credit for the rescue, repair and rehabilitation of its building. The tax credit lasted for a period of five years. The expiration of the rehabilitation tax credit has resulted in a substantial increase in real estate taxes for SERCAP.

SERCAP has implemented numerous projects throughout Virginia and the Roanoke Valley region. One project included a Loan Fund Program to help lowincome rural communities fund water and waste water system upgrades and new construction of facilities. One example of SERCAP's ability to leverage in-kind service dollars for the Roanoke City's neighborhoods is its VFC-Alternative Break Program. The program relies on the efforts of community partners and volunteers to join in service projects that directly improve the quality of life of City residents.

Background:

Pursuant to the requirements of the Virginia Code, if City Council wishes to consider the application of the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia, Inc. for tax exempt status, Council must first conduct a public hearing. Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church is a Virginia non-stock, not-for-profit corporation that has applied for tax exemption of real property in the City located at 1018 1st Street, S.W., Roanoke, VA 24016 (Official Tax Map #1022404).

Considerations:

In October 2016 Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church began using the property for mission purposes. The Diocese began using the property as the Aidan Community, a young adult intentional community, which is part of the mission and outreach ministry of the Diocese. The property will house the Aidan Community consisting of four young adults aged 21-35. The young adults will live in the residence as participants in a faith community. A faith community is centered on participation of daily prayer, Holy Eucharist, spiritual training and development, community service and outreach. The Diocese seeks to make the Aidan House and Community the center of young adult ministry for The Episcopal Church in Roanoke. The program has three major goals to create leaders and missionaries for the young adult ministry, to appeal to young adults who might not otherwise attend a traditional Episcopal Church but who may be willing to attend services and activities and lastly to encourage young adults to pursue mission work more broadly. The Aidan Community will therefore be doing the young adult ministry work of the Episcopal Church and the Diocese.

VFC-Alternative Break Program. The program relies on the efforts of community partners and volunteers to join in service projects that directly improve the quality of life of City residents.

Subject: Request to Schedule a Public Hearing: Sale of Land of Approximately 3.4056 Acres and Improvements -Former Villa Heights Recreation Center (CM17-00060)

Background:

The City of Roanoke is proposing to sell approximately 3.4056 acres of land which contain the former Villa Heights Recreation Center located at 2750 Hoover Street, N.W., and identified as Official Tax Map No. 2430601, (Property) to Restoration Housing (Buyer), a Virginia non-stock corporation, and its subsidiaries or affiliates that may be created to own and/or operate the Property. The Buyer proposes to pay One Dollar (\$1.00) for the property; and during the due diligence period, make an initial non-refundable investment to stabilize the Property's roof structure.

Upon successful listing of the property on the State and National Historic Registers, the securing of historic tax credits in support of the renovation of the Property, release of the Property as Villa Heights Park, and satisfaction of other conditions in the proposed contract, the Buyer will close on the Property, and proceed with the renovation of the existing building within a certain time schedule, in order for the renovated facility to be used in support of non-profit community youth service activities and related functions. The Buyer will also have access to insurance proceeds in the amount of \$234,000 from the City to aid in the renovation of the Property, subject to certain performance terms and conditions of the proposed contract. The release of the Property as Villa Heights Park will be the subject of a separate proceeding before the Planning Commission and City Council following notification from Buyer that Buyer has completed its due diligence to its satisfaction and is proceeding with the proposed contract.

Subject to City Council's concurrence with this request, a copy of the proposed Contract for Purchase and Sale of Real Property will be placed with the City Clerk for review prior to the public hearing. Pursuant to the requirements of State Code, notice of the public hearing must be advertised at least seven days prior to the public hearing. The public hearing would occur on June 19, 2017, or at such later date as the City Manager determines.

Recommended Action:

Authorize the scheduling and advertising of the proposed sale of the Property for a public hearing on June 19, 2017 at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard, or at such later date and time as the City Manager shall determine, in his discretion.

Subject: Emergency Procurement - Traffic Signal Reconstruction at the intersection of Orange Avenue and 19th Street

The traffic signal located at Orange Avenue and 19th Street was supported by two wooden poles located on the northwest and southeast corners of the intersection, respectively. The southeast corner pole has been repeatedly damaged by turning semi-trailer trucks over the last year. Approximately a month ago, the southeast corner pole was completely destroyed. Currently, the intersection is operating under a two-way stop control via stop sign. With the complete destruction of the southeast corner pole, Transportation Division staff began to take immediate steps to restore operation of the traffic signal.

Prior to the last incident at the intersection, plans had been developed to procure services to relocate the traffic control cabinet and reconstruct the entire traffic signal. As a part of the planning process, Davis H. Elliot Company, Inc. provided a cost estimate for the purpose of budget planning. Davis H. Elliot has been contracted to provide services associated with restoring the traffic signal at a cost of \$14,685 without using the formal procurement process. Their scope of work will be limited to installing two new wooden poles, a new traffic control cabinet concrete base, electrical junction box, and traffic signal cables. The remaining project work will be done with in-house resources.

Pursuant to Section 41 of the City of Roanoke Charter, this letter is to advise Council of the statement of the facts constituting the emergency procurement as outlined above.

Subject: April FY17 Financial Report - City of Roanoke March FY17 Financial Report - Roanoke City Public Schools

The following financial report provides commentary on the City's financial results for the ten months ended April 30, 2017 and Roanoke City Public Schools for the nine months ended March 31, 2017.

General Fund

Through April FY17, year-to-date revenues were \$226.5 million, or 80.3% of the adopted revenue estimate for the year. Year-to-date revenues increased 1.4% or \$3.1 million compared to the same period in FY16.

General Property Tax Revenues were \$0.8 million or 0.7% below FY16. Real Estate tax, comprising 98.2% of the current year budget, was \$0.5 million or 0.7% above the prior year. Personal Property Tax Revenues were \$0.6 million or 2.9% below prior year, with these taxes not due until the end of May.

Other local tax revenues at 73.9% of budget, were approximately \$0.2 million or 0.4% below FY16. Business License Tax was \$34,000 or 0.3% higher than FY16, due to the timing of receipts and represents 92.3% of FY17 adopted budget. Prepared Food and Beverage Tax was slightly above the previous year by \$0.2 million or 1.7%, and at 74.2% of budget for FY17. Motor Vehicle License Tax continued to perform well increasing \$0.2 million or 28.6%, and 39.5% of budget for FY17. Other contributors to the revenue increase were the timing of reimbursements for Social Services expenditures, federal and state Emergency Management Reimbursements for Derecho related support, and increases in street maintenance and several public safety services.

The Revenue increases were offset by several underperforming local taxes. Sales tax, which included sales through March of 2017, was 3.7% or \$0.6 million less than FY16, and was 9.1% below year-to-date budget. Total Sales tax for FY17 is projected to be

\$2.0 million below budget and includes approximately \$500,000 of transfers received in error for other localities. Transient Occupancy tax decreased 0.7% or \$26,000 compared to the previous year, and was 6.4% below year-to-date budget. Communications tax decreased \$0.1 million or 2.5% compared to FY16, and was 0.5% below year-to-date budget. A revenue shortfall of \$3.5 to \$4.0 million is still projected for FY17.

Through April, expenditures were \$234.0 million, or 82.2% of the adopted expenditure budget for the year. Year-to-date expenditures increased by \$7.4 million or 3.3% compared to the prior year. The increase was attributable to medical services to jail inmates, Children's Services Act (CSA) programs, timing of capital projects and paving contracts, expansion of Roanoke Valley Broadband and increased funding to Roanoke City Public Schools.

Stormwater Utility Fund

Year-to-date Stormwater fee revenue as of April 30, 2017 was \$5.8 million or 102.3% of FY17 anticipated revenues. Operating expenses were \$3.8 million, or 72.8% of the expense budget resulting in an operating gain of \$2.0 million. Change in net position, after transfers and contributions, was a gain of approximately \$1.6 million. Stormwater fees are being charged using a phased in approach. In FY16, which was the second year of implementing the fee, the approved fee was 60 cents per billing unit of impervious service. In FY17, the approved fee increased to 90 cents per billing unit. This is the third and final year of the phased in approach.

Civic Center Fund

The FY17 year-to-date change in operating revenue through April was \$262,000 lower than the budgeted revenues, but \$867,000 higher than the prior year primarily due to the timing of events. Correspondingly, operating expenses were \$707,000 lower than budgeted, but \$626,000 higher than the prior year. The operating loss was \$444,000 lower than the fiscal year-to-date budgeted operating loss and \$241,000 lower than the prior year. The year-to-date change in net position was a loss of \$416,000 which was a decrease of \$246,000 over the prior year, and an improvement of \$510,000 when compared to the budgeted loss of \$925,000.

Parking Fund

Through April, approximately 87.2% of anticipated operating revenue has been realized. Increases in Market Garage revenues are partially related to the completion of the hotel construction. Gainsboro Garage and the Higher Ed Center lot have increased occupancy as a result of new businesses moving into the downtown area. Elmwood lot revenues are lower due to decreases in Anthem and Meridium employee parking. Revenues in total have increased 8.3% over the prior year and operating expenses have decreased by 1.1%. Operating income, before the net decrease of non-operating revenues, expenses, and transfers was approximately \$918,000 compared to \$670,000 in the prior year. After non-operating transactions, the fund's change in net position was approximately \$568,000.

Roanoke City Public Schools

Financial performance of Roanoke City Public Schools is reported to City Council on a quarterly basis. These results are reported on a one-month lag compared to City results based on the timing of School Board and City Council meetings. Accordingly, this report includes results through March. The School General Fund amounts as presented in this report correspond with amounts reported to the School Board on May 9, 2017.

Revenues

School General Fund revenues increased 3.3% or \$3.8 million compared to FY16. Revenues increased due to additional funding received from the State and City of Roanoke but were partially offset by a decrease in other revenues due to prior year reimbursements from medical insurance claims.

Expenditures

School General Fund expenditures increased 2.0% or \$2.4 million compared to FY16. Expenditures have increased largely due to the cost of instruction. The increase is due to a School Board approval of a 2% increase or a step increase in addition to correcting salary ranges for personnel employed from 6 to 20 years offset by the timing of a March debt service payment reported in April.

Economic Summary

State General Fund total revenue collections decreased 3.4% in April due to one less deposit day for payroll withholding tax collections. Sales tax collections fell 0.3%. On a fiscal year-to-date basis, total revenue collections increased 3.6% through April, ahead of the revised annual forecast of 2.9% growth.

In April, the national unemployment rate decreased 0.1% to 4.4% from 4.5%. The Virginia unemployment rate decreased 0.1%, from 3.9% in February to 3.8% in March. The most recent Roanoke unemployment rate was 4.1%. National payroll employment increased by 211,000 jobs in April, above the 98,000 increase in March.

The Consumer Confidence Index decreased 4.6 points, from 124.9 in March to 120.3 in April. Consumer confidence declined in April, after increasing sharply over the past two months, but remains at strong levels.

Gross Domestic Product increased at an annualized rate of 1.0 % in the first quarter of 2017 following an increase of 2.1% in the fourth quarter of 2016. Positive contributions included nonresidential and residential fixed investments, exports, and personal consumption expenditures. Offsetting negative contributions included private inventory investment and a decrease in federal, state and local government spending.

Background:

The City of Roanoke continues to provide for the nutritional needs of children and youth during the summer months through a Parks and Recreation supervised Summer Nutrition Program. Breakfast and lunch are provided to children throughout Roanoke from mid-June through mid-August. An estimated 25,000 meals will be served this summer. Federal funds, up to \$124,510, have been awarded to the City by a grant from the Virginia Department of Health. The City is reimbursed on a per meal basis for meals actually served. The remaining funds necessary to staff this program are allocated in the Parks and Recreation operating budget.

Considerations:

The Summer Food Program is partially funded through the United States Department of Agriculture, Food and Nutrition Service, with the Virginia Department of Health serving as the sponsoring agency in Virginia. The program is similar in concept to the National School Lunch Program with eligibility requirements much like those used to determine eligibility for free or reduced priced meals during the school year. The purpose is to provide nutritionally balanced, healthy meals to children, ages one through eighteen, and those with special needs. Participating locations include Apple Ridge Farm, Bluestone Park, Dominion Day Services, Eureka Center, Indian Rock Village, Intercept Youth Services, Jamestown Place, Jesus Is Lord Church, Lansdowne Park, Preston Center, and Villages at Lincoln.

Recommended Action:

Accept the Summer Food Program grant in the amount of \$124,510 and authorize the City Manager and City Clerk to execute and attest respectively, an agreement with the Virginia Department of Health and any other forms necessary to accept such grant, approved as to form by the City Attorney.

Subject: Approval of Resolution Supporting Roanoke Electric Steel Corporation's Application for a \$300,000 Industrial Access Railroad Track Program Grant to Support the Company's \$28 Million Expansion (CM17-00055)

Background:

Since 1955, Roanoke Electric Steel Corporation (dba Steel Dynamics – Roanoke Bar Division) has been engaged in manufacturing, scrap processing, and marketing of merchant steel products and billets. Originally founded as Roanoke Steel, the company was acquired by Fort Wayne, Indiana-based Steel Dynamics in 2007. The company employs approximately 425 individuals at the Roanoke facility, and provides well above average wages and benefits for this region.

Roanoke Electric Steel Corporation officially announced in February 2017 a \$28 million expansion project at the Roanoke facility located at 102 Westside Boulevard, N. W.; this expansion will require new storage shelters, expansion of the railroad track network, and rehabilitation of an existing building to integrate a new reheating furnace and a new finishing area into the facility. The project would increase melting and casting capability to increase rolling capacity from the current 500,000 tons to over 600,000 tons per year. This project also adds product diversification to allow the company to quickly grow market share. The expansion will result in the creation of approximately 11 new full-time positions, and will necessitate retraining of approximately 307 employees with assistance from the Virginia Jobs Investment Program.

Considerations:

Roanoke Electric Steel Corporation is applying for a grant from the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation for an Industrial Access Railroad Track Program to assist with rail upgrades. As part of the required grant application, a resolution from City Council must be included stating support for funds to be allocated to the proposed expansion and upgrading of rail on the company's property at 102 Westside Boulevard, NW. The requested grant amount of \$300,000 will go towards approximately \$500,000 in rail upgrades at the Roanoke facility; no city funding is required. This phase of the rail project will lengthen an existing in-house rail spur, add an additional spur, and connect both spurs to the scrap yard/marshaling yard. This will remove a significant choke point for rail traffic and make operations more efficient. Presently, 3,257 inbound and 1,713 outbound rail cars access the plant each year and with this expansion it is anticipated the number of rail cars will increase 34% annually, to 4,361 inbound and 2,293 outbound, necessitating the improvements to track efficiency.

Recommended Action:

Adopt the attached resolution to support Roanoke Electric Steel Corporation's Industrial Access Railroad Track Program grant application in the amount of \$300,000 from the Department of Rail and Public Transportation to assist with rail upgrades on the company's property, which will support a major expansion of the Roanoke facility, increasing efficiency, production, and employment.

Background:

The City of Roanoke engages a group of citizen/social service professionals, the Human Services Advisory Board, to review and make recommendations on funding requests received from various social service agencies during the City's operating budget development process. The Human Services Advisory Board is made up of nine members as follows:

Elliott Bayer, Chair, Citizen

Gary Heaton, Pastor, Greene Memorial United Methodist Church Cheri Hartman, Carilion Clinic, Dept. of Psychiatry and Behavioral Medicine Wilton Kennedy, Director of Clinical Education Jefferson College of Health Sciences – PA Program Marion Vaughn-Howard, Citizen Bradley Stephens, Director, CoLab Tom Powers, Citizen Hollie Young, Services Coordinator, Friendship Health and Rehab Paula Prince, Asst. Professor, Jefferson College of Health Sciences

Steven Martin, Director of Human/Social Services serves as ex officio member of the Advisory Board.

The City of Roanoke collaborated with the United Way to form a joint Administrative application, and to have the City's Program application available on the United Way's online system. The deadline for submission was January 26, 2017 for both the Administrative application and the Program application.

Requests from 35 agencies (44 programs) totaling \$654,184 were received as indicated on Attachment A. Advisory Board members reviewed the applications online and studied each application prior to meetings held on February 10, February 17, February 23, March 2, and March 9, 2017 to discuss funding allocations. The Board considered the following when reviewing the

applications and making funding recommendations: alignment between the application and priorities set by the Human Services BFO team, a fully completed application, clarity and internal consistency of the application, clarity and reasonableness of the proposed agency budget, demonstration of need, and the number of Roanoke City residents served.

Agencies were recently notified of tentative allocations and advised they could appeal these recommendations. The Board heard appeals on April 6, 2017, from Planned Parenthood, LOA Area Agency on Aging, Child Health Investment Partnership (CHIP), Greenvale School, and Roanoke Community Garden Association. After hearing the appeals, the Human Services Advisory Board voted to increase the allocation to LOA Area Agency on Aging by \$9,000 and to Greenvale School by \$5,000. In total, the Board approved \$357,000 in allocations as shown in Attachment A.

Performance audits will be conducted by the Council of Community Services to evaluate the effectiveness and efficiency of all funded programs.

Recommended Action:

Approve the recommendations of the Human Services Advisory Board, as shown in Attachment A.

Authorize the City Manager to enter into a contract with the Council of Community Services to conduct the performance audits with the form of the contract to be approved by the City Attorney.

Transfer \$357,000 from the Human Services Advisory Board account 01-630-5220-3700 into accounts to be established within the Human Services Advisory Board budget by the Director of Finance as set forth in Attachment A.

Subject: Recommendations of the Roanoke Arts Commission on Arts and Cultural Agency Funding for FY-2018 (CM17-00058)

Background:

The Roanoke Arts Commission Agency Funding Advisory Committee budget, in the amount of \$340,000, was established by City Council with the adoption of the General Fund budget for FY 2018 on May 15, 2017.

A mandatory pre-proposal meeting was held in December, 2016 to assist the agencies and organizations with the application process. Applications which included procedures and ratings criteria were distributed to all former recipients and other interested organizations.

Applications from seventeen (17) agencies totaling \$306,104 were received as indicated on Attachment A. These agencies each applied for funds to support specific exhibitions, performances or educational programs. Two major agencies, the Jefferson Center and the Science Museum of Western VA did not meet the application deadline. Additionally, the History Museum of Western VA decided not to apply this year because they are restructuring their operations into one facility.

Committee members thoroughly studied each application and interviewed representatives of the applicant organizations prior to a rating and allocation meeting held in April, 2017. Through the application, organizations are required to demonstrate how their proposal would support implementation of the City's Arts and Cultural Plan. Agencies were also rated on other indicators such as effective management and financial health, collaboration and if the proposed program meets a need in the community. The committee also considered the report from the program monitor, Susan Jennings, Arts and Culture Coordinator, on the performance of the organizations funded the previous fiscal year. The monitor collects quarterly reports and conducts an annual site visit. The committee presented the recommendations to the entire Arts Commission and these recommendations were unanimously approved on April 18, 2017 to present to City Council as attached.

Agencies were then notified of the Arts Commission recommendations and tentative funding allocations, subject to final approval by City Council.

Considerations:

The funding criteria by which applications are scored also reflect the major priority areas established by City Council in the Budgeting for Outcomes process.

Recommended Action:

Concur with and approve the Roanoke Arts Commission's allocation for funding various nonprofit agencies for Fiscal Year 2018 as set forth in Attachment A to this report.

Adopt the accompanying budget ordinance to transfer \$340,000 as cited on Attachment A from the Roanoke Arts Commission Agency Funding Advisory Committee into accounts to be established by the Director of Finance within the Roanoke Arts Commission budget.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Roanoke that Council concurs with and approves the recommendations of the Roanoke Arts Commission's allocations for funding in the amount of \$340,000 for various nonprofit agencies for Fiscal Year 2018 and the Arts Commission, as more particularly set forth in the City Council Agenda Report dated June 5, 2017, to Council, and the attachment to that report.

Subject: Amendment to Chapter 6, <u>Animals and Fowl</u>, of the Code of the City of Roanoke, Virginia (1979), as amended, by enacting sec. 6-29. (CM17-00049)

Background:

The tethering of dogs for extended periods of time is inhumane. Extended tethering of dogs or tethering of dogs in distress has been shown to result in both physical and psychological injuries to the animals. The enactment and enforcement of laws that restrict the tethering of dogs to reasonable limits is a best practice and has already been enacted in other municipalities. Section 3.2-6543 of the Code of Virginia (1950), as amended, allows municipalities to adopt ordinances to protect animal welfare in keeping with the Code of Virginia.

Considerations:

The Animal Protection and Services Unit of the Roanoke Police Department requests the enactment of City Code Section 6-29, <u>Tethering Restrictions</u>. This code section will limit the tethering of dogs to no more than 3 accumulated hours during the day between 6:00am and 10:00pm. It will prohibit tethering between the hours of 10:00pm and 8:00am, prohibit the tethering of sick dogs, injured dogs, or dogs in heat, and prohibit the tethering of dogs under 4 months old.

The Animal Protection and Services Unit of the Roanoke Police Department, as with all new ordinances, intends to educate the public prior to active enforcement.

Recommended Action:

Adopt the accompanying ordinance to enact Section 6-29 of Chapter 6, <u>Animals</u> and Fowl, of the Code of the City of Roanoke, (1979), as amended.

AN ORDINANCE amending and reordaining Chapter 6, <u>Animals and Fowl</u>, to add a new Section 6-29, <u>Tethering Restrictions</u>, Division I, <u>Generally</u>, Article II, <u>Dogs Generally</u>, of the Code of the City of Roanoke, (1979), as amended; providing for an effective date; and dispensing with the second reading of this Ordinance by title.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Roanoke that:

1. Chapter 6, <u>Animals and Fowl</u>, Article II, <u>Dogs Generally</u>, Division I, <u>Generally</u>,

of the Code of the City of Roanoke, (1979), as amended, is hereby amended and reordained to add a new Section 6-29, Tethering Restrictions:

* * *

Section 6-29 - Tethering Restrictions

(a) Definition:

Tethering: a rope, chain, or the like, by which an animal is fastened to a fixed object so as to limit its range of movement.

- (b) As authorized by section 3.2-6543, Code of Virginia (1950), as amended; a tethering restriction shall be enforced pursuant to section(s) 3.2-6587, Code of Virginia (1950), as amended. The animal wardens shall enforce this restriction regarding dogs shall be tethered:
 - 1. No more than three (3) accumulative hours during the day between <u>6am and 10pm.</u>
 - 2. No tethering shall be allowed between 10pm and 6am.
 - 3. No sick, injured, or animals in heat shall be tethered at any time.
 - 4. No animals under four (4) months old.

* * *

Subject: Amendment to Chapter 20, <u>Motor Vehicles and Traffic</u>, of the Code of the City of Roanoke, Virginia (1979), as amended, by enacting Section 20-18. (CM17-00050)

Background:

The City of Roanoke has a diverse and active calendar of community events throughout the year. Some of these events, such as parades and festivals, involve the movement of livestock on public roadways.

Considerations:

The Roanoke Police Department, in an effort to ensure safe vehicular and pedestrian traffic, requests the enactment of City Code Section 20-18, <u>Livestock Prohibited on Public Roadways</u>. This code section will allow the police department to ensure that livestock are not allowed to interfere with the free flow of traffic on public roadways. Livestock consisting of cattle, sheep, horses, goats, llamas, pigs, and other domestic animals ordinarily raised or used on a farm, will not be allowed to transit a public roadway unless a public assembly permit has been obtained. The police department, as with all new ordinances, intends to educate prior to active enforcement.

Recommended Action:

Adopt the accompanying ordinance to enact Section 20-18 of Chapter 20, <u>Motor</u> <u>Vehicles and Traffic</u>, of the Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), as amended.

1. Chapter 20, <u>Motor Vehicles and Traffic</u>, Article I, <u>In General</u>, Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), as amended, is hereby amended and reordained to add a new Section 20-18, <u>Livestock Prohibited on Public Roadways</u>:

* * *

Sec. 20-18. Livestock Prohibited on Public Roadways.

- (a) The following words and phrases, as used herein, shall have the following meanings, unless a different meaning is plainly required by the context.
 - 1. Public Roadway means improved public right of way designed for use of vehicular travel, including the shoulder of the road, but excluding any designated sidewalk.
 - 2. Livestock includes cattle, sheep, horses, goats, llamas, pigs, and other domestic animals ordinarily raised or used on a farm. Chickens, turkeys, geese or other domesticated fowl are considered poultry and not livestock within the meaning of this code section.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to allow livestock to enter or travel upon a Public Roadway, except in the case where there is an approved public assembly permit that allows the livestock to be a part of that approved parade and/or public assembly.

(c) Penalties. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. Each separate incident may be considered a new violation.

Background:

There have been two pedestrian fatalities in the Roanoke Valley over the past year. Pedestrian traffic and public safety are concerns that the City has authority to regulate. In an attempt to improve pedestrian safety on the City's busiest streets, the City is seeking to regulate pedestrian traffic on those streets where the lanes of travel are separated by a median. The police department and the City's traffic engineers have collaborated in the drafting of this ordinance with the focus of pedestrian safety.

Considerations:

The Roanoke Police Department is committed to protecting our pedestrians throughout the City. Therefore the police department, in working with the City's traffic engineers, requests the enactment of City Code Section 20-69, <u>Prohibited Activities on Public Roadways with Medians</u>. This code section will allow the police department to better regulate pedestrian traffic on streets with medians. Further, this code section will better protect pedestrian traffic while ensuring the free flow of motor vehicle traffic through these high volume corridors. The police department, as with all new ordinances, intends to educate its personnel and the public prior to active enforcement.

Recommended Action:

Adopt the accompanying ordinance to enact Section 20-69 of Chapter 20, Motor <u>Vehicles and Traffic</u>, of the Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), as amended.

AN ORDINANCE amending and reordaining Chapter 20, <u>Motor Vehicles and</u> <u>Traffic</u>, to add a new Section 20-69, <u>Prohibited Activities on Public Roadways with</u> <u>Medians</u>, Division 1, <u>Generally</u>, Article IV, <u>Stopping</u>, <u>Standing and Parking</u>, Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), as amended; providing for an effective date; and dispensing with the second reading of this ordinance by title.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Roanoke as follows:

1. Chapter 20, <u>Motor Vehicles and Traffic</u>, Article IV, <u>Stopping</u>, <u>Standing</u> and <u>Parking</u>, Division 1, <u>Generally</u>, Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), as amended, is hereby amended and reordained to add a new Section 20-69, <u>Prohibited Activities on</u> Public Roadways with Medians:

* * *

Sec. 20-69. <u>Prohibited Activities on Public Roadways with Medians</u>.

- (a) The following words and phrases, as used herein, shall have the following meanings, unless a different meaning is plainly required by the context.
 - 1. *Public Roadway with a Median* means improved public right of way designed for use of vehicular travel with a median area in the middle of the roadway separating two or more lanes of travel, including the shoulder of the road, but excluding any designated sidewalk.
 - 2. *Median* means any area in the middle of any roadway separating two or more lanes of travel, designed to provide a barrier to keep traffic on one side of a roadway from going to the other side of the roadway. A median may be a raised concrete strip or a grass strip, with or without curbing, between any two lanes of travel on a public roadway.
 - 3. Designated Pedestrian Crosswalk or Clearly Marked Crosswalk means that part of a public roadway at an intersection included within the connections of the lateral lines of the sidewalks on opposite sides

of the roadway measured from the curbs or, in the absence of curbs, from the edges of the traversable roadway; or any portion of a roadway at an intersection or elsewhere distinctly indicated for pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings.

- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to step into a public roadway with a median that is open to moving vehicular traffic in any location other than a designated pedestrian crosswalk, except in the case of authorized maintenance, an emergency, an accident, or mechanical breakdown.
- (c) It shall be unlawful for any person to step onto a median of any public roadway open to moving vehicular traffic, unless that median is part of a designated pedestrian crosswalk, except in the case of authorized maintenance, an emergency, an accident, or mechanical breakdown.
- (d) Penalties. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. Each separate incident may be considered a new violation.

Subject: Designation of Market Square as a City Park and Amending and Reordaining Chapter 24, Buildings and Property Generally, to Amend Sections 24-93, 24-97 and 24-103 of City Code (CM17-00059)

Background:

The Market Square, an area of public right-of-way located along the south side of Campbell Avenue, S.E. at its intersection with Market Street, S.E., immediately to the south of the City Market Building, has long been used as a place of public assemblies, festivals, and the Historic Roanoke City Market (Market). The Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), as amended, (City Code) currently regulates several activities that take place within the Square. The regulation and management of the Square is governed by Section 24-61 et seq. of City Code (Public Markets) subject to the provisions of The Historic Roanoke City Market Handbook promulgated by the City Manager. The hours of operation authorized by Section 24-64 of City Code are from 5:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. seven days a week, though actual hours of operation may vary based on circumstances and time of year at the discretion of the Market Manager with the consent of the City Manager. The Market is managed by Downtown Roanoke, Inc. under contract with the City.

With the significant capital improvements completed in 2014, the viability for the public's use of the Square at various times of the day and night during weeknights and weekends has increased significantly. In order to provide a more comprehensive framework of managing and regulating activities within the Square during those times when it is not operating as part of the Market, it is necessary to undertake several actions.

Considerations:

The first action for the City Council's consideration is the adoption of an ordinance that amends Section 24-103, <u>Definition; purpose</u>, of City Code to clarify the method by which parks may be designated, either through designation in the City's Comprehensive Plan, or by a specific action of the City Council such as the Resolution being adopted as it pertains to Market Square Park. This measure will be effective on passage.

Following this action, City Council will consider the adoption of a resolution designating the Market Square as a City Park. This designation will enable the Market Square to be managed by the City under the provisions of the City Code specific to Parks and also provide for the applicability of administrative rules and regulations for Parks and Greenways promulgated by the City Manager during times when not operating as the Market.

Because of the unique uses and activities that take place in the Market Square, Chapter 24 of City Code is proposed to be amended and reordained to add a new Section, 24-93 <u>Market Square Park</u>, which will define the use, operation, and management of Market Square Park (Park) specifically, including when the park is closed; the acknowledgement of the use of the Park as the Market as outlined above; the provision of outdoor dining within designated areas of the Park; the regulation of the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages within the Park; the permitting of street vending and sidewalk sales within the Park; and the means to regulate and manage the public rights-of-way encumbered by the Park.

In order for the various events held in Market Square Park to continue to provide for the possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages, amendment to Section 24-97, <u>Possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages</u>, <u>Article IV, Parks</u>, of City Code is necessary. The inclusion of Market Square Park as a park facility where alcoholic beverages would be allowed would be subject to the limitations set forth in Section 24-93, as amended, and described above.

Recommended Action:

Adopt the proposed ordinance to amend Section 24-103 of City Code to clarify the process by which the City may designate property to be a public park, with an effective date upon passage.

Adopt the proposed resolution designating the Market Square area as a public park with an effective date as of July 1, 2017.



AN ORDINANCE amending and reordaining Chapter 24, Public Buildings and Property

<u>Generally</u>, Section 24-103(a), <u>Definition</u>; <u>purpose</u>. Article IV, <u>Parks</u>, Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), as amended; providing for an effective date; and dispensing with the second reading of this ordinance by title.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Roanoke as follows:

1. Section 24-103(a), Possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages, Article IV, Parks,

Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), is hereby amended and ordained to read and provide as follows:

* * *

Sec. 24-103. - Definition; purpose.

(a) The term "park," as used in this article, shall mean (i) any land, water, right-ofway, or way owned or managed by the city that is designated in the city's comprehensive plan as a park; (ii) any land, water, right-of-way, or way owned by the city that is designated by city council as a park; or(iii) any land, water, right-of-way, or way which is administered by the city as such a park, including, but not limited to, the Carvins Cove Natural Reserve (as defined in section 35-14);; (iv) and all of the city-owned lands contiguous to and along the Roanoke River, Mill Mountain, and the Fishburn Parkway and Blue Ridge Parkway.

* * *

2. This Ordinance shall become effective upon adoption.

3. Pursuant to Section 12, Roanoke City Charter, the second reading of this ordinance by title is hereby dispensed with.

A RESOLUTION designating a certain area of City owned property known generally as Market Square as a City park; and providing for an effective date.

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 2 (12) of the Charter of the City of Roanoke, and Section §15.2-1806, Code of Virginia (1950), as amended, the City may establish and designate City owned property as a public park;

WHEREAS, the area known generally as Market Square located on both the east and west sides of Market Street, S.E., Roanoke, Virginia adjacent to Campbell Avenue, S.E., Roanoke, Virginia is currently used by the public as a Farmer's Market, as a public gathering space, and for other various public purposes, and which areas are depicted in blue on the attached exhibit;

WHEREAS, that these uses are consistent with those of a public park; and

WHEREAS, this Council deems it proper and fitting that this public space known generally as Market Square be designated as a City park.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Roanoke that:

1. The area known generally as Market Square located on both the east and west sides of Market Street, S.E., adjacent to Campbell Avenue, S.E., and as more particularly depicted in blue on the attached exhibit be designated as a City park.

2. The name of this new City park shall be known as "Market Square Park."

3. The City Manager is hereby authorized to take such actions and execute all necessary documents as may be necessary to file an application to amend the City's comprehensive plan showing this area of City owned property as a City park.

4. This Resolution shall be effective on and after July 1, 2017.

Sec. 24-93. Market Square Park.

- City Council has designed certain areas of the public right-of-way located along (a) the southerly side of Campbell Avenue, S.E., and the easterly and westerly sides of Market Street, S.E., as Market Square Park, which park is more particularly depicted in blue and described in the plan attached as Exhibit A to the resolution dated June 5, 2017, disgnating Market Square Park and on file with the City Clerk. Prior to its designation as a public park, the area within Market Square Park has been used for several purposes, including but not limited to, a public market as permitted under Section 24-61 through 24-77 of City Code; outdoor dining as permitted pursuant to Section 30-9.1 of City Code; street vending permitted pursuant to Section 30-9.2 of City Code; and events conducted, operated, or promoted by private parties under agreements with the City. City Council recognizes that Market Square Park is also used as a public right-of-way by pedestrians and vehicles. Based on these various uses, City Council has adopted this Section 24-93 to address the unique requirements and circumstances involving market Square Park. The use, operation, and management of Market Square Park shall be subject to the provisions of this Section 24-93 and, where not in conflict with the specific provisions of this Section 24-93, the provisions of Chapter 24, Article IV, Parks.
- (b) Closing Hours.

- (1) Market Square Park shall be closed between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m., daily, and it shall be unlawful for any person to enter or remain in Market Square Park during these hours.
- (2) Subsection (b) of this section shall not prohibit passing through Market Square Park, in a vehicle along Market Street, S.E., or along the sidewalks within Market Square Park, without stopping during the hours that Market Square Park is closed.
- (3) Owners or operators of businesses that operate abutting to Market Square Park and individuals with residences within buildings abutting Market Square Park may travel to and from their respective places of business or residences are excepted from the restrictions set forth in subsection (a) of this section.
- (4) Persons holding licenses to operate space within any public market in Market Square Park are excepted from the restrictions of subsection (a) of this section with respect to their operations during the period of 5:30 a.m. to 7:00 a.m.
- (c) Public Markets.
 - (1) Areas of Market Square Park may be used as a public market in accordance with the provisions of Sections 24-61 through 24-77 of City Code.
 - (2) Persons desiring to obtain a license to use space within Market Square Park designated as a public market shall comply with the provisions of Sections 24-61 through 24-77 of City Code.
 - (3) All persons holding a valid license or permit issued pursuant to Section 24-66 as of the date of adoption of this section shall have the right to such license or permit through the date on which such permit or license expires without further application, upon expiration of such license or permit, such person shall comply with Section 24-66 to obtain a new license or permit.
- (d) Outdoor dining within designated areas of Market Square Park.
 - (1) Persons or entities that own or lease property adjacent to the easterly, southerly, or westerly boundaries of Market Square Park may apply for a permit to conduct outdoor dining within designated areas of Market Square Park in accordance with Section 30-9.1 of City Code.
 - (2) Restrictions with respect to sale or consumption of alcoholic beverages within parks as set forth in Section 24-97 shall not apply within areas designated and permitted for outdoor dining within Market Square Park. The sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages by customers of permittees who have received permits pursuant to Section 30-9.1 of City

Code shall be subject to the permit and license issued to such permittee by the commonwealth of Virginia Alcohol Control Board (ABC) and all applicable laws, rules, and regulations of the Commonwealth of Virginia and ABC.

- (3) All permittees holding valid permits issued pursuant to Section 30-9.1 of City Code for outdoor dining within an area of Market Square Park as of the date of adoption of this section may continue to use such permit until the date on which such permit expires without further application. Upon expiration of such permit, the permittee shall comply with Section 30-9.1 in order to obtain a new permit.
- (e) Possession or Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages within Market Square Park.
 - (1) Persons or entities may apply to the city manager for authorization to allow the possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages within Market Square Park in accordance with Section 24-97 (b)(1) of City Code. Persons or entities receiving such authorization shall comply with the terms and conditions of such authorization. The restriction regarding hours of operation set forth in Section 24-97 (b)(4) shall not apply to the possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages within areas of Market Square Park. The authorization provided by the city manager shall specify the specific hours of operation.
 - (2) The provisions of this Section 24-93 (e) shall not apply to the possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages by permittees holding valid outdoor dining permits for outdoor dining within designated areas of Market Square Park.
- (f) Street vending within Market Square Park.
 - (1) Persons seeking to conduct street vending for the sale of food or beverages from a cart shall be subject to and comply with Section 30-9.1 of City Code, including obtaining a permit pursuant to Section 30-9.1 of City Code.
 - (2) As set forth in Section 30-9.1(2) of City Code, a street vending permit pursuant to Section 30-9.2 is not required for vending in the areas designated as a public market within Market Square Park during the hours of operation of the public market.
- (g) Sidewalk sales within Market Square Park.
 - Sidewalk sales, as permitted pursuant to Section 30-4.1 of City Code, shall be permitted within portions of Market Square Park designated as sidewalks, subject to the terms, conditions, and requirements of Section 30-4.1 of City Code.
- (h) Regulation of streets and sidewalk applicable to Market Square Park.

- Unless otherwise specifically provided in this Section 24-93, the provisions of Chapter 30, Streets and Sidewalks, shall be applicable to the public right-of-way encumbered by Market Square Park.
- (i) The City Manager is authorized to make such other rules and regulations regarding the use, operation, administration, and management of Market Square Park that are not inconsistent with this section or the Code of Virginia (1950), as amended.

AN ORDINANCE amending and reordaining Chapter 24, Public Buildings and Property

Generally, to amend Section 24-97(b), Possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages, Article IV,

Parks, Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), as amended; providing for an effective date; and dispensing

with the second reading of this ordinance by title.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Roanoke as follows:

1. Section 24-97(b), Possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages, Article IV, Parks,

Code of the City of Roanoke (1979), is hereby amended and ordained to read and provide as follows:

* * *

Sec. 24-97. Possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages.

(b) Subsection (a) of this section notwithstanding, the city manager is hereby authorized to allow alcoholic beverages to be consumed on the premises of Elmwood Park, Century Square at Church Avenue, S.E., designated as Official Tax Map No. 4010305 ("Century Square"), Mill Mountain Park (including the Discovery Center and any shelters at Mill Mountain Park), Mountain View (including Mountain View Recreation Center), Vic Thomas Park, Wells Fargo Plaza at Market Street, S.E., located adjacent to the Market Square Walkway ("Wells Fargo Plaza"), Reserve Avenue Park, Holton Plaza, Preston Park (including Preston Park Recreation Center), Fallon Park (including Fallon Park Shelter, but not including Fallon Park Pool and Fallon Park School, which includes the buildings and the adjacent property used and maintained by Roanoke City Public Schools), Smith Park (including Smith Park Shelter), Highland Park (not including the enclosed area designated as Highland Dog Park within Highland Park), and Wasena Park designated as Official Tax Map No. 1222301 (including Wasena Brick Shelter and Wasena Stone Shelter), and, subject to Section 24-93 of City Code, Market Square Park, hereinafter collectively referred to as the "designated park facilities," under the following conditions:

2. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after July 1, 2017.

3. Pursuant to Section 12, Roanoke City Charter, the second reading of this ordinance by title is hereby dispensed with.
